He was born in Centralia, PA he was the son of the late C. Dean and Dora Antrim.

He was a WW2 Air Force Veteran serving as a Field Mess Sargent and attaining the rank of Staff Sargent. After his Air Force service, Joe remained at Wright Patterson Air Force Base, working in the Research and Development Programs until his retirement in 1971. He received his BS in Business Administration while in the service.

Joe was an active member of the Antique Automobile Club of America, having had a collection of 10 antique autos, including a rare Grant Automobile. From 1956 to 2008, he never missed the annual National Antique Automobile Meet, held in Hershey, PA . After retirement, Joe enjoyed maintaining his antique autos and traveling with his wife, Nancy.

Joe and Dora used to take me on many trips in and out of state where we would sell antique auto parts. If it were not for Joe, I would have NEVER seen any of the United States, would have never been exposed to antiques, and would have never become the man I am today at 55 years of age. I remember you and I meeting after Dora's funeral in 1976 and I drove us all out to lunch. I was so happy that Joe had finally been able to marry, and what a wonderful women he married! Dora was a little possessive and Joe was an incredible son to her and Dean. I remember the house on Park End Drive and the building Joe built for the autos. Incredible. Joe was a handsome, masculine, kind, and fun guy that was naturally likable to everyone. I used to love to hear about Dora and Joe's antique collecting days in the 1950's and even earlier. I was passionate about the old house at Cambridge and Broadway, the dogs Fotsie and Seizure, and some of the wonderful talks we all had 40 years ago.
